Pam's commitment to helping people understand the natural environment has followed her from her early days as an interpreter with the United States Forest Service, to her work as a 5th grade classroom teacher, and into retirement as pre-service faculty instructor and ONREP facilitator. Throughout her lifetime she has contributed her time, expertise, and passion for the outdoors by volunteering. For over 40 years she has devoted her life to natural resources education.

As an ONREP facilitator she has mentored many facilitators and considers sharing with other educators an honor. She views learning as a mutual journey and reflects that view in the way she shares the process of setting up and facilitating a solid workshop. She takes time to plan with them, listen to them, and ask them questions. Experienced ONREP facilitators also consult with her on a regular basis. At the *Fall 2008 Facilitator Summit* Pam was asked to share her professional story where she told us the journey of how her passion of writing and forests came together. Teaching how to think instead of what to think comes through in her facilitation, mentoring, conversations and sharing.

FOREST STEWARDSHIP AS SERVICE LEARNING



This past spring the Camp Fire USA Mt. Hood Council, applied for a Greenworks! Grant through National Project Learning Tree and received funding for: [Camp Onahlee's Future Forest](#).

Camp Onahlee has used this grant opportunity to share with the campers and greater public the benefits of timber harvest, monitoring, restoration and service learning.

The project is empowering youth, adults and local organizations to get involved in five key aspects:

1. Development of educational materials and kiosks that trace the reforestation process
2. Maintenance of previously planted fir seedlings
3. Planting and maintenance of additional diverse tree species.
4. Monitoring of key components such as water distribution and precipitation, temperature, soil conditions, etc. over time.
5. Identification and removal of invasive species with potential to effect new growth
