FACILITATOR HIGHLIGHT: LORI LAMARCHE



Lori LaMarche was awarded the Mary Rellegert Forestry Education in 2009. She has been an Oregon Natural Resources Education Program facilitator for over 10 years and a science teacher at Stayton High School for 17 years. During her time at Stayton High School she has focused student learning on forest resources, ecology, biology and wildfire. Recently, Lori led the development of a partnership program to create a 36-week high school course-called Introduction to Forest Resources-that integrates classroom instruction, guest speakers and field labs. She has also created an articulation agreement with Chemeketa Community College that allows students to earn five college credits upon course completion. Lori has initiated and coordinated the Science Club and the Association of Oregon Forestry Club at Stayton High.

STEWARDSHIP SCHOOLS THROUGHOUT OREGON

ONRE Program's Stewardship Schools program focuses on working with an entire school to design and implement a systematic integration of natural resources education both inside and outside the classroom. Core to the program is working in partnership with teachers, administrators, and community partners to identify goals and create a plan of action. ONRE Program provides

professional development trainings to assist them in meeting their natural resource education goals.

Four schools are presently participating and each has a unique approach in using natural resources as a context for learning.

Evans Valley Elementary School includes a monthly water quality monitoring plan; and an upcoming forest management plan that will help create a safe and healthy outdoor learning laboratory.

Elkton Charter School is adopting a riparian area along a nearby creek to use for restoration and long-term study as well as comparison studies with their existing land lab.

The work, integration and passion of these teachers are truly inspiring.

Alien Invasion: Plants on the Move ONRE Program is working in partnership with the Alien Invasion advisory board, and partnering agencies such as BLM to deliver workshops on Invasive plants. This curriculum, developed by BLM, included extensive content contributions and reviews, as well as being reviewed and field tested by educators.
